Child Care Solutions

Number of training opportunities offered in 2016: 293

Number of parents, providers and community members in attendance: 606

Number of children impacted through training and support: 4,155

During 2016, Child Care Solutions was able to add a full time Professional Development Specialist to increase the amount of training opportunities and technical assistance visits offered to preschool teachers in our 11 county region.



Keys for Kids

Keys for Kids Preschool provides services and support to children and their families through an individualized program that will maximize potential, encourage independence, promote inclusion, and improve the quality of life for those children and their families. In 2016, Keys for Kids Preschool served 249 students from 2 through 5 years

 Our full-day two-year-old classroom now accepts children ages 1 and 2.

of age in Howard and Miami Counties.

Program updates include:

- Our half-day and special education classrooms became licensed level 4 Paths to Quality and NAEYC accredited.
- We received a grant from the Community Foundation of Howard County providing free preschool to 14 children.

Early Head Start

Early Head Start serves 114 pregnant women and children who are considered at risk. This includes homeless families, families below the poverty level, children in foster care and those receiving public assistance such as Supplemental Social Security. Services include family education around parenting practices and gaining stability, day services such as child care and health services to insure that children receive all recommended preventative care. The program also includes prenatal support, mental health assessments, education, and coaching. Recent program updates include:

- 78% of children are up to date on recommended preventative care such as immunizations, physicals and dental examinations helping them to be healthy and ready to learn.
- The program's wait list currently stands at **94 children**.

Positive Results for Kids

• • • • • •

Our therapy program continues to provide pediatric services in the areas of developmental, occupational, physical and speech language therapies in Howard and Miami counties. Thanks to help from United Way of Howard County, we also provided three FREE developmental screenings to children from birth to 5 years of age and received 100% parent satisfaction rating. In 2016, we served 83 children through our school contracted services, 113 children through the Indiana First Steps program and 76 children through our Outpatient Clinic.







Beans

For nearly 60 years, Bona Vista Progams has collaborated with thousands of businesses, families and other nonprofit organizations to make countless projects become a reality. This year, farming and fundraising – two words our community knows well – became our latest partnership thanks to some incredible people and a philanthropic corporation.

The concept was developed by some of the organization's closest friends, Tom and Karen McKinney. Their daughter, Christie, has been in Bona Vista's services for more than 30 years. Together, the McKinney's, their farm staff and employees of FCA US Indiana Transmission Plants have created a field of opportunities for children and adults at Bona Vista.

Along with many other contributors of the project such as CoAlliance, Pioneer HiBred, Austin Henderson (dealer), and Kokomo Grain, the McKinney's and their farm staff planted more than 35 acres of soybean plants in July in a field across from the two FCA US Indiana Transmission Plants in Kokomo.

The funds raised after harvest – \$25,000 – was a program-related investment in order for the organization to become more effective and resilient in providing services to individuals with special needs in the community.

In 2017, the field will be planted with corn. We look forward to this continued partnership for many years to come, and thank the McKinney's, FCA US and the many contributing businesses who made the first year a success.



Bona Vista Industries' (BVI) mission is to deliver quality. efficient, and cost effective outsourcing options satisfy our customers' subcontracting and business needs. BVI provides vocational and life experiences in an integrated industrial setting. In FY 16, BVI continued to provide parts cleaning for the automotive industry, assembly and sub-assembly, first aid kits, spill kits, mailings, scanning, shredding and recycling in Howard, Miami and surrounding counties. During the last fiscal year, BVI served 219 consumers in our Kokomo and Peru facilities. BVI assists adult

individuals of all abilities in

having a meaningful, daily

work experience.

Supported Living

The Supported Living program provides residential support in the home of the person served. Services are provided for as little as one hour a week up to 24 hours a day. Goals for individuals in the program range from daily living skills, residential management, budgeting and shopping,



community integrations, financial management and management of medical needs. In 2016, the program was awarded a housing grant to begin the Meridian Park project. The Meridian Park project will provide housing for 13 additional individuals, and is projected to be completed Spring 2018.

Program updates include:

- 42 residential sites (37 in Howard County, 4 in Peru and 1 in Tipton)
- Number of Persons Served: 69
- Age Range: 21-75 years old
- Gender: Male 44; Female 25



CHIO

Community Based Habilitation Individual

• • • • • •

Community Based Habilitation Individual is a goal based program that includes services outside of the individual's home. CHIO supports learning and assistance in the areas of: self-care, sensory/motor development, socialization, daily living skills, communication, community living and social skills. Community based activities are intended to build relationships and natural supports.

PAC

Participant Assistance and Care

• • • • • •

Participant Assistance and Care services are provided to assist persons served to live successfully in their homes. PAC service is a non-goal based program that can be provided outside or inside the home of the person served. PAC services support learning and assistance in the areas of: daily living skills, self-care, scheduling appointments, paying bills, chores, cooking meals and leisure activities.

RSPO

Respite Care

• • • • • •

Respite Care services is a non-goal based service. RSPO care is typically provided in the home of the primary caregiver, however it can be provided in the community. RSPO service offers relief or a period of rest to the regular caregiver.

In 2016, 44 new intakes were completed and 179 individuals received services through CHIO, PAC and RSPO.









Residential

Our Group Homes continue to serve 64

individuals

throughout Howard and Miami counties. The individuals living in the eight group homes require 24-hour care to increase their skills in areas such as decision making, socialization, personal care, various aspects of maintain and operating a household, managing finances and safety needs. Many of the adults also participate in one of our day programs or work services. Program updates include:

- 6 homes in Kokomo, and 2 in Peru
- Gender: Male: 42; Female: 22

Behavior Management

Behavior support services improve each individual's quality of life. Our team of behavior therapists work alongside the individual's team, consisting of staff, family and case management, to identify behavioral issues that hinder the individual from reaching their maximum potential. Once behaviors are identified, the therapist then puts together a plan and strategy in place to monitor and appropriately address the behavioral concerns. Individual's services are funded through the Bureau of Developmental Disability Services (BDDS) and are funded through the Family Supports Waiver (FSW) and Community Integration and Habilitation Waiver (CIH). In 2016, the behavior therapists provided support and services to 28 individuals.





WorkForce Diversity

WFD provides employment support services to individuals in 14 counties. A team of employment specialists assist individuals of all abilities in finding and maintaining employment. Our staff also work with high school students in preparation for employment after leaving school.

- WFD served 258 individuals in 2016.
- The program continues to participate in the Indiana School-to-Work Collaborative in Grant and Cass counties. This program prepares high school students with disabilities for work by providing employment coaching, family training, benefits planning and internships.
- Bona Vista's WorkForce Diversity was chosen by Indiana Vocational Rehabilitation as a provider of Pre-Employment Transition Services in Howard, Grant, Miami, Tipton and Wabash Counties. Bona Vista and Carey Services will work together to help students ages 14-22 prepare for life after high school.
- Thanks to a grant from the Staples Foundation, two WFD staff members became certified Employment Specialists through the Indiana Institute on Disability and Community at Indiana University, and three staff members attended Benefits Information Network trainings.



BONA VISTA'S DAY PROGRAMS

Our **Habilitation** department currently serves 108 individuals in Kokomo and Peru through either group or individual sessions. Each person served will determine goals they would like to work on with their team. These goals for individual sessions can range from simple math and reading skills to more complex goals such as working through a driver's manual.

Additional opportunities available for persons served in the habilitation department include:

- -The Joyful Noise Choir, which meets weekly and performs throughout the year.
- The Bona Vista Bistro Group, which works on food safety skills and food service job readiness skills. Individuals participate in the Bona Vista Community Tours, Samaritan Caregiver's Chocolate Celebration, and help sell Coke and coffee sales at the Crossing location.
- Art for All Abilities classes with local artist teaching specific art techniques.

Sky's the Limit is an innovative program alternative that offers classes for our persons served to experience a meaningful day. Each week in Sky's the Limit there is a different theme filled with activities focused around that theme. Persons served attend a variety of educational classes including art, nutrition, cooking, exercise, and much more. Throughout the day, persons served attend three separate class sessions and enjoy socialization time with friends.

Sky's the Limit serves **50** individuals daily. The program has three spacious classrooms and a full kitchen. Each persons served has a specific goal they are working on while attending Sky's the Limit.

The **AIM (Action, Inspired & Motivated)** program is goal-based and encompasses many opportunities for career exploration with meaningful community engagement and leisure activities. Persons served have the opportunity to develop products of their choice to sell in the Bona Vista Gift Store.

The Kokomo AIM Studios opened in January 2017. The Gift Store opened in December 2016.

AIM currently serves **43** individuals throughout Kokomo and Peru.

The **Bona Vista Out & About** program is centered around persons served individual goals and provides opportunities for community exploration. In small groups, our persons served will be "out & about" volunteering and discovering the community.

The persons served through **Community Connections** generally need intense supervision and are not currently at the level needed to work independently in the community. This program is offered in Kokomo and Peru. Activities are focused on personal goals and improving daily living skills. These include cooking, exercise, music appreciation, academics, pre-vocational skills, crafts, and much more. Within the engaging activities provided, persons served focus on skills related to fine motor, gross motor, sensory and problem solving. The overall goal of Community Connections is to provide opportunities for our persons served to reach their maximum potential in an environment filled with choice.

Community Connections currently serves **35** individuals in Kokomo and **9** in Peru. We welcomed the new Director of Community Connections, Trudie Hedrick, in mid-November. She has 19 years of public education experience where she was a classroom teacher, principal, and superintendent. She understands curriculum development in order to meet the needs of the individual goals of the persons served at Community Connections.

THANKS FOR IMAGINING THE POSSIBILITIES

Bona Vista's newest location at 1800 S. Plate St. opened on April 20, 2016! The new facility offers a place of inclusion for the entire community. Sherry Otto, a parent and past board member said it best, "The building is more than a facility—it's a tribute to the people we serve."

The total project cost was more than \$1.2 million. The facility includes more than 8,000 square feet of space for the Community Connections program and the community to participate in family nights, parent

trainings, resource fairs, child care conferences, and much more. Although the building, which was destroyed by the tornado in 2013 was insured, the proceeds did not fully fund the new replacement structure.

Bona Vista launched a Legacy Brick campaign as part of the BV Pal Rebuild Project to complete the new facility to house the Community Connections Adult Day Program.





The Legacy Brick program represents a critical piece of our overall BV Pal fundraising goal. When planning the fundraising for the building, Bona Vista wanted to offer opportunities for all donors, regardless of the amount, to make a gift and be recognized for their generosity. The Legacy Brick program is that opportunity. The Legacy Brick program provides an affordable way for all supporters of Bona Vista to become a permanent part of the organization's history.




Tornado

Fortunately, though, there were no casualties and the quick action of Bona Vista staff was nothing short of commendable. With 200 children at our Laguna Street location during the time of the tornado, staff held and read to children to keep them calm. Staff at The Crossing had been in the process of loading buses to send persons served home, and made sure that everyone made it inside to safety in a matter of minutes.

While we did receive some damage to our Laguna Street, Imagine That! and residential facilities, repairs started quickly and the delays in service were minimal. The people we serve are important to us. They deserve our best, whether that's during a weather emergency or a regular day of the week. That's what we give them.


